





Message to Our Community

What a year this has been. We have had many challenges even as we were presented with a myriad of opportunities to create new services for the good of the communities we serve. One of LifeStream's core values is the belief that each individual's needs are best served in the community with a full continuum of care that addresses the whole person. From counseling and medication to education, wellness and housing, the unique needs of the individuals we serve will always be met with care and compassion.

LifeStream would not exist without the support of our wonderful partners, including the County Commissions, School Boards, Judicial Systems and Sheriffs in Lake and Sumter counties. Thanks to our legislative delegation and the State of Florida we received funding to create the Road to Home 16 bed residential unit in order to help individuals who have experienced long term hospitalization to integrate back into their home communities. The State also provided funding to create a new clinical team to help families with children who have serious behavioral issues. These programs not only address serious needs in our community, they provided a positive economic impact by the creation of 29 new jobs. These and our other major accomplishments are noted later in this report.

Our journey towards excellence continues with ongoing efforts to integrate primary care with our behavioral health services. We anticipate expanding our Wellness Integrated Network to South Lake County and Umatilla in the coming year, along with an expanded relationship with Langley Health Services in Sumter County.

We continue to be mindful of our responsibility to be good fiscal stewards. As President/CEO, I take this responsibility very seriously. We have been entrusted with resources by our State and Local governments, health insurers, our donors, our friends and the individuals we serve. We deem this to be an extraordinary privilege, and it is very important that we use the resources provided to us judiciously, wisely and prudently.

We would like to thank all of the many friends of LifeStream who have supported us over the past 44 years. Without you, the most vulnerable of our neighbors and loved ones would not receive the help they need. We deeply appreciate all that you do to help us to live our vision.

Fiscal Year 2015 Accomplishments

The innovative sixteen bed Road to Home residential center was provided recurring annualized funding by the Legislature. This program accepts individuals who have not been placed, but who are discharge ready, from the State's long term psychiatric hospitals.

Expanded our provision of primary care through our Wellness Integration Network (WIN). Applied for second SAMHSA integration grant to expand WIN to South Lake County. Also applied to create a Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC) in East Lake County.

Negotiated a capitated Medicaid contract to provide behavioral health services to members of Prestige Health Care in Lake and Sumter counties. Continued negotiations with other HMO's to assure contracts that will cover the cost of providing services.

Worked with State legislative delegation to successfully continue funding for the CAT program and indigent inpatient bed program which were implemented the previous year. The CAT program was changed to recurring funding while the inpatient beds continue as a non-recurring appropriation.

Implemented a new Juvenile Treatment Alternatives for Safer Communities (TASC) program for the five counties in judicial Circuit 5. Funding for this program was provided by Lutheran Services, the managing entity for northeast Florida.

Co-created Progress Health System, Inc. in January 2015 to allow affiliation of non-profit health systems to help achieve cost effective services provided within an efficient revenue structure.

Began providing medication assisted therapy, including Vivitrol and Suboxone. Chosen as a site for the DCF state and FADAA criminal justice Vivitrol program.

Opened a ten bed residential program at Anthony House to provide services to pregnant and postpartum women with substance use disorders.

Partnered with the Eustis Foundation to create the Open Door which will serve as a homeless services day shelter for the Eustis area. Successfully applied for a \$150,000 grant to renovate an owned property and participated in fundraising activities on behalf of the program which is scheduled to open in November 2015.


Provided successful competitive applications to continue the Lake School Board contracts to fund operations of LifeStream Academies and for continuation of the Prevention Partnership grant which funds our Strong United Resilient Families (SURF) program. Three year contracts were issued for each of these grants.

Began the process to make LifeStream a Tobacco Free company. Four of our sites currently operate Tobacco Free and a program is in place to expand the program to other campuses next year.

LifeStream responded to an RFP which requested new ideas to address recidivism in inpatient facilities, and won a \$200,000 grant to utilize our Care Management and Primary Care services to create a health home for individuals with severe and chronic mental illness.
